2.0 CALL TO ORDER - OPEN SESSION, 7:00 pm

The Board reconvened to Open Session at 7:04 p.m.

Student Gavin DeGroot, Gr. 5 – Tiefert View Intermediate School – led the Pledge of Allegiance.

B) Roll Call

A) Student of the Month Recognition

4.1 Student of the Month - Tiefert View Intermediate School

Aubrey Zucco, Principal of Tiefert View Intermediate School, presented Gavin DeGroot, grade 5 to the Governing Board as their Student of the Month.

B) SVHS Student Representative Report

Erica Lill, ASB President of Silver Valley High School, shared with the Board the following:

To date they have had 4 football games, 7 volleyball games, 1 cross country meet today, and the first mathlete meet will be held tomorrow. Announced that they brought back the new ASB card that includes free admission to all the home games, and 10% off all school events for \$30.00 if anyone is interested. They also have a new Senior package which includes tickets for grad night and prom, Senior hoodies, and the ASB card for \$200.00. Homecoming is coming up on Saturday, October 13th and the Junior class is hosting this. The tickets for this are on sale for \$25.00. This year, they are hosting a military appreciation for homecoming, and all military may attend homecoming for free. On Monday, September 17th, students will be going to Barstow Community College for a college tour. Several students participated in a 911 essay contest, and one of the Senior students won this event. Lastly, the Silver Valley Drumline was able to perform at the Fort Irwin 911 event.

D) Public Comments

4.2 Public Comments on Agendized or Non-Agendized Items

Diana Sandridge, teacher from Yermo School, stated they had their 911 Patriot Day today at Yermo school. She thanked Mr. Najera and Mr. Lacey for attending the event, and for Mrs. Henson for supporting the event. Several active military personnel, retired military, and Yermo's Fire Dept. were also in attendance, and thanked them for their presence. Also thanked Yermo ASB for doing all the flags and learning about flag etiquette.

Deb Farrington, teacher from Yermo School and Newberry School, and thanked Robert for all the work that has been done at Yermo School, and the support from Jesse and Jeff. However, there is still a huge concern on the water pressure issues at the school and is requesting that this issue be made a top priority and have someone come in and look at our equipment due to the ongoing problems and to get "hands-on" help to correct this problem.

E) Board Member Reports

Mark Staggs stated that he heard a lot of good things regarding Robert and Marc from employees in the district. He also pointed out the first recipient, Robin Schreiner, of the Jill S. Kemock award and recommend everyone stop and look at the plaque in the hall.

Karen Gray addressed everyone in the room, staff, parents, school liaisons, stating that everyone did a great job getting students registered and staff ready for the new year, and encouraged them to please ask the administration if they are in need of anything as this is very important for the board as a whole as our goal is to serve and support our families and students.

F) Superintendent

Jesse Najera shared with the Board that the Patriot Day event at Yermo School was awesome and done very well. It was great to see all the students holding flags, and the band did a great job, as well. Having active duty members, veterans and first responders' present was amazing and he hopes that this is the beginning of an awesome annual tradition.

Mr. Najera informed the Board members of the upcoming State of Education address hosted by the County Superintendent. The last few years the Superintendent has publicly congratulated our Silver Valley for our graduation rates. This event will be on October 19, 2018 3:30-5:00 p.m. at the High Desert church in Victorville, and if any board members are interested in attending to let Martha Bootsma know.

He, then, stated that he had the privilege to attend the Back-to-School nights at TVIS and they did an amazing job. There were lots of folks who attended, had root beer floats, and Mrs. Zucco and her staff did an outstanding job on this event. He, also, attended the AEC Back-to-School night which was also done very well. They had lots of food, games and prizes happening, and community business members participate in raffles. Great job to the staff at AEC for putting this event together.

G) Enrollment/ADA Report

We have 2160 students, 70 more than what we had last year, and attendance rate at 96%. Last year we did really well on attendance rate, and this year we are a quarter percent higher this year than we were last year.

H) SVUSD Soundbites

Jeff Youskievicz shared with the Board that he was able to attend the 911 Memorial ceremony at Fort Irwin which was amazing. He was honored to be a part of this and he really appreciated Col. Krummrich's story that he shared at this ceremony regarding his role on that fateful day of Sept. 11, 2001 and the beginning months after. Mr. Youskievicz personally thanked Col. Krummrich for his service and his involvement after 911.

Jeff Youskievicz informed the Board that Initial Professional Development is wrapping up with our teachers, and is thankful that we are able to provide these trainings, and for the teachers' willingness to participate.

Jeff Youskievicz, and Marc Lacey both shared that the Back to School Nights at all the schools went very well. All the staff did outstanding jobs at each of these events serving food and playing games, and each one was well attended by parents and students. Mr. Lacey, also, added that after the Back to School night event at the high school they had their Senior night which went very well! It was very positive and well attended by parents and students. There was a great presentation given and lots of good information was shared there.

I) Fort Irwin Commanding General's Representative

Col. Krummrich reported that at the last board meeting in August he was in Sacramento at the Governor's Military Counsel, and got to highlight with the key leaders there the great relationship he has with our school district and the great communication that is happening.

He is also amazed that we are already into the school year a month, and it has been a great start to the new school year. He, also, reported that Pamela Murray is doing great learning the job and is very pleased with the work she is doing.

He then thanked Jeff Youskievicz, the SVHS Drumline, and the essay winners for their attendance and participation in the 911 Remembrance ceremony at the Fort today. Lastly, he added that he has not said no to a fund-raiser yet, and encouraged that Silver Valley keep them coming to help our students and schools. He recommends that we connect with the Morale and Recreation office for support and get the paperwork turned in and they will get it done to raise money, or items for raffles, etc.

J) School Liaison Officer, Fort Irwin

Pamela Murray, SLO for Ft. Irwin, announced that Red Ribbon Week is coming up and the plan is to visit the schools and engage the students in activities centered on Red Ribbon week, and providing prizes and incentives for the students.

K) School Liaison Officer, Marine Corps Logistics Base

Adam Diaz, SLO for MCLB, mentioned that the Back-School Brigade and school supply distribution held at the MCLB went very well. He was able to service approximately 82 students, in addition, to the 30 Marines located at China Lake.

With the new CO on board at the MCLB, he would like to arrange some school tours for him to visit the schools and will work that out with him and the district.

Lastly, he would like to organize an activity with the AEC Food class and have them come to the installation and tour the Route 66 Family Restaurant and get a “eyes-on” and “hands-on” view of how a restaurant business is managed.

President Karen Gray invited both Col. Krummrich and Col. Clemmons to the State of Education Address being given by the County Superintendent on October 19, 2018.

L) CSEA Representative

Roberta McElfresh, CSEA Chapter President, shared that they have been very busy with lots of movement in the classified employees, filling positions as people move to new positions and seeing lots of growth in house candidates and members do appreciate it.

M) SVEA Representative

Deb Farrington, SVEA President, shared that it has been a very exciting, busy, and tiring beginning of the school year. It has been a real joy to see many new faces coming in, and hoping that we can fill all the open positions. The trainings that have been happening have been very good, and so important, and the teachers need them. Overall, everyone is status quo with no complaints being mentioned, and there is an understanding that patience is needed as everyone is learning new roles, and hopes that all the new roles know that they have support on the backside as they learn.

7.12 Second Reading BP/AR 3100 - Budget

In section "Budget Development and Adoption," revise last paragraph of section to reflect Education code 42127, as amended by SB 78 (Ch. 19, Statues of 2015), as follows: If the County Superintendent disapproves or conditionally approves the district's budget, the Board shall review and respond to his/her recommendations at a public meeting on or before (September) OCTOBER 8. The response shall include any revisions to the adopted budget and any other proposed actions to be taken as a result of those recommendations.

In section "Budget Review Committee for Disapproved Budgets," revise 4th paragraph of section to reflect Education Code 42127.3, as amended by SB 78 (Ch. 19, Statues of 2015), as follows: If the SPI disapproves the district budget after reviewing the committee's report and the district's response, the Board shall consult with the County Superintendent as he/she develops and adopts, by (November 30) DECEMBER 31, a fiscal plan and budget that will allow the district to meet its financial obligations. For the current fiscal year, the district shall operate in accordance with the budget adopted by the County Superintendent.

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (SB 751) which provides that, if the amount of monies in the state Public School System Stabilization Account is three percent or more of the combined total of general fund revenues appropriated for school districts and allocated local proceeds of taxes, the district's combined assigned or unassigned ending general fund balance must not exceed 10 percent of those funds in the immediately following fiscal year, unless the district is a basic aid district, is a district with average daily attendance of 2,500 or less, or is exempted by the county superintendent of schools under extraordinary fiscal circumstances.

9.0 BUSINESS SERVICES

9.1 Resolution No. 18-19-02: Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

As required by the Williams Act, and in accordance with Education Code 60119, a survey of instructional materials in the district was completed to determine the level of sufficiency of textbooks and instructional materials. The definition of sufficiency means that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials to use in class or at home. These materials must be aligned with state standards and adopted by the Governing Board. Based on the information obtained through the instructional material surveys, it is determined that we have sufficiency of instructional materials.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Governing Board adopt Resolution No. 18-19-02: Sufficiency of Instructional Materials.

9.2 Resolution No. 18-19-03: GANN Limit

In November of 1979, California voters approved Proposition 4, an initiative that added Article XIII B to the California Constitution. This constitutional amendment, known as the Gann Initiative, placed limits on the growth of expenditures for publicly funded programs. Division 9 of Title 1, beginning with Section 7900 of the Government Code, was then added to law to specify the process for calculating state and local government appropriation limits and appropriations subject to limitation under Article XII B of the Constitution. These constitutional and statutory sections explain and define the appropriations limit and appropriations subject to limitation as they apply to state and local government, and require that each entity of government formally "adopt" its appropriations limit for a given fiscal year.

By September 30 of each year, Education Code sections 1629 and 42132 specify that each county office and district Governing Board shall adopt a resolution identifying their estimated appropriations limits for the current year and their actual appropriations limit for the preceding year. The documentation supporting the adoption resolution shall be made available to the public.

Recommendation: I recommend the Governing Board adopt the Resolution No. 18-19-03: GANN Limit as presented.

9.4 Recommend approval of Tree Services with Unique Landscaping

Yermo School has 15 Chinese Elm trees that are in desperate need of trimming/removal services. The current status of the trees is dangerous due to the possibility of falling branches which often occur during the high winds in our area. In the recent past, there have been incidents of branches falling, without injury or property damage. To ensure the highest possible level of safety for our students, staff and property, these trees need to be trimmed and/or removed.

There are a total of 15 Chinese Elm Trees that need service. 6 in the front of the school area that will be crowned and thinned, 2 trees that will be thinned, and 7 trees near the cafeteria area that will be removed. 6 of these trees are completely dead and 1 is diseased.

Work will be performed during weekends to further ensure the safety of our staff, students and property, and also to not be a noise distraction.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Governing Board approve Unique Landscaping for Tree Services at Yermo School.

10.1 Provisional Intern Permit

Administration has hired Sheena Brewster to teach Social Science at Fort Irwin Middle School and Brandy Sanchez to teach 4th/5th grade at Yermo School. Both teachers have their Bachelors in the subjects they are teaching, have taken and passed CBEST and are enrolled in teacher prep programs at accredited universities. The Provisional Intern Permit will allow them time to complete coursework requirements.

Recommendation: Administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve the requests for Provisional Intern Permits for Sheena Brewster, a teacher at Fort Irwin Middle School, and Brandy Sanchez, a teacher at Yermo School, for the 2018-2019 school year.

By promoting good nutrition and exercise, schools can help children develop well-balanced diets and lead healthier lives.

People were invited to wear and display red ribbons to demonstrate their commitment to a healthy, drug-free lifestyle - meaning no use of illegal drugs, and no illegal use of legal drugs.

Red Ribbon Week has grown into a major national observance offering communities the opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to healthy, drug-free life-styles. In addition to the ongoing drug prevention programs, our district acknowledges Red Ribbon Week with various activities.

Red Ribbon Week is designated October 23-31, 2018 and the theme for this year is "LIFE IS YOUR JOURNEY, TRAVEL DRUG FREE."™

WHEREAS, the State of California has declared the second full week of October (8-14) 2018 as the “Week of the School Administrator” in Education Code 44015.1; and



WHEREAS, school bus transportation is eight times safer than traveling in a passenger vehicle and is the safest form of ground transportation available;

WHEREAS, school buses meet higher construction, equipment, and inspection standards than any other vehicle, and school bus drivers meet higher qualification, training, and testing standards than any other drivers;

WHEREAS, according to the National Academy of Sciences, an average of 820 students are killed annually during school transportation hours, but less than 2 percent of them are school bus passengers;

WHEREAS, despite the industry's best efforts, accidents still happen;

WHEREAS, an average of seven school-age passengers is killed in school bus crashes each year, and an average of 19 children are killed each year getting on and off the bus;

WHEREAS, most of those killed are children aged five to seven, and most often those children are killed in the area immediately surrounding the bus - either by a passing vehicle or by the bus itself;

WHEREAS, School Bus Safety Week, which is celebrated in more than 40 States and sponsored by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), was created to remind all students of the best ways to get on and off the bus in an effort to enhance the safety of the Nation's children;

WHEREAS, School Bus Safety Week, which dates back to 1966, also recognizes the hard work and dedication of school transportation personnel, especially the many school bus drivers who ensure a safe journey each and every day; and

WHEREAS, School Bus Safety Week, celebrated the third week in October, promotes awareness through activities built around themes that raise awareness of school bus safety issues;


